FOR COMMUNITY GARDENS OR NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS:

Parks & People Foundation

Grants up to \$5,000. Parks & People helps communities transform vacant lots and unused space into community gardens, play spaces, outdoor classrooms, and gathering spaces. Grants are available to start a new project or upgrade an existing project.
